A CONVENTION UNLIKE ANY OTHER

I grew up in Cleveland and had the Catalog from Abbott's Magic Company in Colon, Michigan pretty much memorized, but going to their annual summer convention was only a dream...until this year! On the last day of July, I found myself at the 75th Annual Get Together in Colon, the Magic Capital of the World.

It was an amazing and wonderful five days, and much of it was outdoors, so different from most magic conventions, which are held in giant hotels. The village of Colon has fewer than 1500 inhabitants, and it is bordered by two beautiful lakes. Its lovely location



and its closeness to Chicago made it ideal for Harry Blackstone's summer home. He and Percy Abbott are the ones who put Colon on the magic map. Many of the photos in the article were taken by Wayne Wissner, a magician/photographer who was snapping away

from his excellent seat right next to mine, Row F center, during the evening shows.

The convention featured fewer lectures than most conventions, but the ones I saw were excellent. Tina Lenert, Mac King and Adele Friel Rhindress (*Memories of an Elusive Moth*) gave wonderful and inspiring 90-minute presentations in the surprisingly comfortable and air-conditioned high school gymnasium. The performers in the evening shows were, almost without exception, excellent and usually hilarious. Of special note were the four

MC's, Tom Mullica, Michael Feeney, Michael Caveney and Mac King. Mullica's appearance was amazing, because barely two years ago he was diagnosed with bone marrow cancer. After a year in treatment, he has returned to the performing full time, as Red Skelton, in Branson, Mo. Also excellent on stage were Tim Wright, Tina Lenert, Stuart and Lori, David Charvet, Ardan



james and Dale Salwak. Dana Daniels, well known for his act with Luigi the Psychic Parrot, took over after intermission on Thursday evening and did his full 50-minute NO SHOW, in which none of the acts show up and are replaced by the janitor (Daniels), complete with live piano music. He had the audience of 1500 laughing so hard that it hurt.

What made this convention extra special for me was the small town feel of the whole week, seeing world famous magicians walking around in shorts, sandals and t-shirts, trying to connect faces with names, and being able to walk all over town, even in the heat, without ever taking an elevator.

Oh yeah, our own Dave Cresey showed up at this, his 30th Get Together, having ridden his Harley from Boston. Do you think he'll let me ride along with him to the next one?
