



## President's Message – Ryan Lally

Compeers,

There is an abundance of information at our disposal, far much more than any other humans in history have had access to. We've used this information to create a kind of world that was only possible in science fiction a few decades ago. On a personal level, we each have access to more knowledge than the smartest men and women who have ever lived.

This is especially advantageous to magicians. Ray Goulet would always tell me that magicians are like the scientists of the arts. We use so many aspects of so many different arts and sciences in a single magic trick that the sleight-of-hand is almost secondary. The music that the trick is set to; the lighting that perfectly masks a thread of string; misdirection based on how our monkey brains choose to perceive things. Magicians know how to combine the best elements of the arts and sciences and turn them into something fantastic.

You and I aren't alone in this. We have the knowledge of hundreds of years of magicians to help us along this journey. Now more than ever books written by some of history's greatest magicians are easily accessible. Dover Publications does a great job at taking classic magic books that have fallen into public domain and producing them as inexpensive paperback books.

But with so much information, there comes a risk. In this case, the risk is information overload.

Reading too many magic tricks can paralyze you into taking action with any one of them. To truly develop a great routine with a trick takes months of hard work. Reading through one of the great classics, taking in hundreds of the best tricks ever conceived, how can you choose a single one to focus on without distraction? It certainly takes an act of will.

Faced with so many choices, indecision runs rampant. It's so much easier to not pick any particular trick to develop than it is to pick one that you soon find out is subpar. It's a painful thing to put in the months of work into a trick that was doomed to fall flat from the start. Maybe it's because it doesn't fit your style, or maybe it is impractical to the environments you generally perform in. But it falls flat nonetheless, and months of work have been wasted.

This is why magicians should take a step back from the information we consume and focus deeply on one trick at a time. By doing so, we can free up our minds to get the most out of any particular trick without second guessing ourselves by reading about other miracles in Tarbell or Mark Wilson. Focus on a trick, see it from every possible angle, and don't let distraction take away our precious attention. This is the way to develop a great routine. And sometimes, all you need is one great routine to become a star. Cheers, Ryan Lally
