Ring 122 September Ring Report

During the meeting portion of our Zoom, Kevin Butler agreed to take on the role of Sgt. at Arms for the club! Members discussed having ring member Daniel Barbas take on the position of Newsletter Editor and he has since agreed to that, so congratulations Daniel! Members also discussed the need to update the contacts of our Facebook and email to Debbie O'Carroll as she is secretary and also to Daryl Vanderburgh. Davy discussed starting a Ring 122 Instagram account, however since there was not a majority of members present on the Zoom that idea was put aside for now. Davy does have his own Instagram account that is underused so possible he could start cross promoting the Ring there?

Thinking ahead, for December we are proposing having an in-person dinner meeting perhaps at the 99 in Stoneham or a Chinese Restaurant that wouldn't mind if we hung around the table and did magic after we ate.

And with that, the business meeting was over and we had an entertaining time talking about Show Openers. David Penn led off with Silly Billy's 4-sided, 2-sided sign prop which is a running gag with a 2-sided sign that somehow had 4 sides, no, yes, never, and always. Davy likes it because it's a silly way to get the audience involved right away.

Dan Bybell likes opening with the Multiplying Dots effect where he talks about the phenomenon of optical illusions before getting into the multiply dots effect. Dan likes that because it establishes expectations for the rest of the show, and that the show will be fun and full of jokes. Dan also has started with a Needle in a Balloon effect in which he draws a face on the balloon and then points out every balloons worst enemy is a needle! Then he turns the face on the balloon upside down which turns it into a frown followed by pretending to hypnotize the balloon! This makes for a Sudden Impact opening. Kevin Butler added that he's done the similar idea but said the needle is a flu shot for the balloon.


Mikey Lee's favorite opening is the Bowling Ball from a Briefcase. He loves that it gives a great big thud which you can't miss. He's also done Wine Bottle from Silks as his opener. Mikey in general likes doing production numbers as openers. He has also opened with Richard Osterland's Forsyth for a lounge show and done Deck to Wand (which in a funny way is similar to the bowling ball) as an opener.

Kevin Butler likes doing appearing cane for an opener as it's quick and it gets people to pay attention. He likes starting with something that will grab the audience's attention fast. Kevin also mentioned David Oliver's Zigzag sequencing concept of how two plan routines, and he tries to plan ahis shows with an opener, a middle effect and then a finishing effect and keep rotating that sequence. For example, Kevin opens his card trick portion of his shows by producing a deck from a folder piece of paper which is Sudden Deck by David Regal. Kevin muses about going to the Bicycle Card Factory as part of his patter.



Lastly, Jim Rainho said during his nightclub heyday, "We always started with music. His act began with a cane appearance to Cane to Silk, to a dove production. Jim also liked to do a production as a start for any show, and then trying to do something to get audience involvement. However, he liked to do production at the start to get the crowd astonished early. And with that said, we adjourned to next month where the theme will be Halloween magic effects!

Magic in Boston: 1940 to 1980



discussion about what it was like to be a working magician in Boston from 1940 to 1980. -



As a baby boomer, it's hard for me to imagine what it was like to be living in a time before television, but what I learned from these folks is that Boston was a much more socially active place then. The number of nightclubs that regularly hired magicians was large and the membership of both SAM and IBM was enormous. In the 21st century, in pre-pandemic days, if there are more than 10 people at a magic club meeting it is considered a success. A Ring 122 report from 1961 notes, "Close to 100 members attended our September meeting." The same report describes a very successful, one-week run of four, daily public magic shows that members performed at the Shoppers World mall. Later in the same article it says, "President Lynskey's theory is to have all members who wish to perform appear at our monthly shows [emphasis added]."1



Alan explained, "All the clubs were up in attendance then. No matter what the theme of the club was-social, political, sports-they were big."



"It was huge," Dave interjected.

"All the clubs were bigger then because people were getting out," continued Alan. "It's a whole different lifestyle now. I mean, in those days only the man worked, and he was allowed one night out with the boys-so you had that going on. And the only other entertainment at the time was television and, before that, radio."

"Television did a job on the clubs," said Ann. Alan, Dave, and Jim all nodded in agreement.

In the winter, many magicians were hired for the Bean Supper circuit, when churches and organizations put on shows for their members. But the Boston nightclub scene provided year-round opportunities. Ann, Jim, Dave, and Alan remembered performing or watching magic at Steubens' Vienna Room or Cocoanut Grove in Boston, Blinstrub's Village in South Boston, The Hillbilly Ranch in Scollay Square (now Government Center), The Frolics in Revere, and The Beachcomber in Wollaston Beach. Framingham had The Meadows, owned and operated by Vaughn Munroe, a popular

big band leader and vocalist with a national following, and Caesar's Monticello. All hired magicians

Jim Rainho remembered. "There were also two clubs



in Charlest---own. One was the Shamrock Village. The other had a stage that went up and down."

"We used to call the clubs in Charlestown
