## President's Report



### Why do people become magicians?

Looking back, I think the reason that I started doing magic in elementary school was that I wanted to be special. I had two older brothers who were three to five years older than I was, and they could do many things that I could not do. They were more athletic, they could draw, they could cook, and they were much stronger than I was! Sometimes I got picked on, other times I just got left at home while they went out and had all the fun. So once I discovered magic when a friend showed me a card trick, I went to the library to see what tricks I could learn. My parents bought me a couple of magic books, and I learned a few card tricks and some tricks with paper clips and dollar bills but that's as far as it went. Growing up, I can only recall going to one magic show which was at my local synagogue. Soon baseball and then running took over my life, and just trying to navigate the crazy days of Middle School and High school. It wasn't until I became a teacher at age 40 that I picked up magic again. Then I got into trouble with my principal for showing magic tricks while walking down a hall when the students made too much noise in response to an effect! I was written up for doing magic, but not in the press, in my personnel file!

Still I continue to be a magician, perform in shows, and help run this club. Here are the reasons you should continue to be a magician and to encourage others to do the same!

- Magic helps you to build self-confidence.
- Magic is a good way of communicating and making connections with others. (Except if you always start every conversation with, "Wanna see a new trick I learned?")
- Magic is a good way to keep your body and mind active. It beats endless games of solitaire!
- Magic has been found to improve your mental health.
- Magic helps you develop your interpersonal skills.
- Magic inspires curiosity and improves creative thinking skills. Magicians invented the concept of thinking outside the box (or getting out of the box).
- Magic improves your fine motor skills.
- Magic helps children develop study skills and learn the value of practice.
- Magic can make your job more rewarding if you include magic in your sales pitch or presentation.
- Magic is a great way to make people happy!
